There at the top of the list was the BEA/ESP. Later that first day one of the men overheard me tell someone that I worked for the Boise School District. The man came up to me very excited and told me he had also worked for the Boise School District for over 20 years. Karma had paid off; the BEA/ESP had been able to sponsor one of our own, a teacher from our district.

Dennis Falk is his name and he told me he had taught 6th grade at Washington Elementary. He said he had
